Policy consultation and advice on issues that impact volunteers and volunteering is a key focus of Volunteering Australia's activities. Throughout the year, Volunteering Australia sought to stay abreast of a very active public policy landscape.

The National Survey of Volunteering Issues was again conducted in early 2008. It explores how volunteers contribute to social change and the impacts of volunteering related public policy issues on volunteers and volunteer-involving organisations. Important findings about background checking, OH&S, insurance and the cost of volunteering help form Volunteering Australia's policy direction and submissions to various levels of government. Other issues in this year's survey included volunteers' sense of community belonging, the level of training support offered to and accessed by volunteers and corporate volunteering.

Other significant policy areas explored by Volunteering Australia during the year have included:

- Federal Budget submission to the Commonwealth Government;
- submission to Strengthening Communities, Supporting Families and Social Inclusion stream of the Australia 2020 Summit;
- advice to the Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs about the concept of offsetting HECS debt through volunteering;
- analysis of mechanisms for the reimbursement of fuel costs to volunteers that could be adopted under the Commonwealth Government's Volunteer Grants Program.

Annual Review 2007 / 08 National Volunteer Week



National Volunteer Week was held from 12th to 18th May and featured the theme "Volunteers Change Our World". NVW was very successful with growth in all major areas of evaluation.

NVW aims to promote volunteering broadly whilst focussing on recognising and thanking volunteers. The general thrust of our marketing also allowed for not-for-profits to use NVW as a recruiting platform.

Highlights included:

- Unique visits to the website up by 33%
- 40,000 lapel pins distributed
- More than 18,000 posters distributed
- More than 4,500 NVW packs distributed
- Radio community service announcement recorded and sent to 370 radio stations around Australia
- Significant media support
- More than 850 media clippings

NVW packs were distributed to all state and federal politicians, all libraries, peak bodies and individuals.

The range of online resources available for free download was well utilised. This included a certificate of appreciation, a media promotional guide, radio CSA, logos and poster, media release templates and tips on how to celebrate NVW.

GoVolunteer has undergone significant growth as it continues to provide an excellent service for not-for-profit organisations and volunteers seeking placement opportunities.

In this year registrations of not-for-profits reached 1,461 a 22% growth over the previous year. On average there are more than 11,500 volunteer positions advertised every month and visits to the website continue to average over 55,000.

Volunteering Australia continues to support academics, researchers and students by providing information about the latest research, linking students to researchers and providing opinion on the current trends in volunteering.

Follow up town visits were made as part of the Enhancing the Grey Nomad Experience and Increasing Volunteering in Outback Towns, led by chief investigators Professor Jenny Onyx (University of Technology Sydney) and Associate Professor Rosemary Leonard (University of Western Sydney). Each town is developing and implementing volunteering projects. One town, Barcaldine has received funding to employ a project worker to lead the Grey Nomad project.

Other towns have developed frameworks for involving short term volunteers and identified specific projects. Research reports on the fieldtrips are available on the Volunteering Australia website.

There are indications that grey nomads as a community will provide a rich source of volunteers as towns and nomads become more aware of the potential for this valuable form of engagement with rural and remote Australia.

Volunteering Australia is currently undertaking research on the feasibility of a proposed National Volunteer Communications and Recruitment Strategy. The aim of such a strategy would be to streamline existing communications with potential volunteers nationally in order to facilitate recruitment while concurrently raising the profile of volunteering in Australia.

The Australian Journal on Volunteering in early 2007 became available both in print format and on-line at the Volunteering Australia website.

The Journal publishes refereed articles and articles from the field, as well as book reviews. Availability via the internet will make the Journal global in its reach. The scope of articles has ranged from building capacity in organisations and regions, motivation; sustainability; international development; management flexibility and leadership.

Volunteering Australia and the Australian Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies Alumni were pleased to award the third annual student prize to Andrea M Petriwskyj for her paper 'Citizen Participation as Volunteering? Opportunities and Challenges for an Inclusive Definition'. Andrea's prize consisted of \$500 generously provided by the ACPNS Alumni and publication in the Australian Journal on Volunteering. Volunteering Australia appreciates the involvement, advice and support of the editorial advisory boards and referees.
